DR. MABEL TYLECOTE has represented the Collyhurst Ward in the Manchester City Council as a co-opted member since November, 1940. She is a member of the Post-War Reconstruction Committee and is Deputy Chairman of the Parks Committee. She has been a member of the Labour Party since she was 18 years of age and has fought two parliamentary elections, a by-election in the Fylde division in November, 1938, and the Middleton and Prestwich division in July, 1945. She is a lecturer for the Workers' Educational Association, is married and has a family.

MR. ROBERT MALCOLM, Jnr., has been active in the Labour, Trade Union and Co-operative movements for 20 years. He has a sound knowledge of social and economic problems and is also an experienced administrator. He is accustomed to dealing with the personal difficulties of citizens, the needs of the Ward and the general requirements of the community.

Municipal Election November 1st, 1945

To the Electors of the Collyhurst Ward, City of Manchester

FELLOW CITIZENS,

The coming to power of a Labour Government calls for the election, on November 1st, of Labour administrations in the cities and towns of this country. The new domestic policies for which our people voted in July can only come effectively into being if local authorities are willing and eager to help and advise the central government in the great task of initiating its schemes and are ready to work hard and enthusiastically in carrying them out.

First and foremost in our social programme comes the provision of houses. We must have good, modern houses, well-equipped and pleasantly situated. And we must have them quickly. Our target for Manchester is 10,000 permanent houses a year. We also maintain that families should not be obliged to live in flats if they do not wish it, and that lifts should be provided in all blocks of flats which are more than three storeys high. The Manchester City Labour Party has issued its housing programme as a pamphlet. We hope you will get it and read it.

Manchester has plans for the creation of a great health service. This would immensely improve all our efforts to prevent ill health as well as establish, through its health centres, a public medical service, offering the best knowledge and making available the best equipment, to all comers. At last we have the opportunity to give proper medical attention to housewives, excluded from health insurance in the past. Give Labour representatives the chance to co-operate

with the Labour Minister of Health, Aneurin Bevan, in making this a really comprehensive scheme, offering us all new hope for the health of ourselves and our children.

For our children, too, we want new, bright schools, smaller classes and a variety of types of school so that children with different interests and aptitudes will all get their chance. We want good, nourishing, well-served meals provided in school. We want more nursery schools, day nurseries and safe playgrounds. Let your Labour representatives help the Manchester-born Labour Minister for Education, Ellen Wilkinson, to get the new Education Act working as quickly as possible.

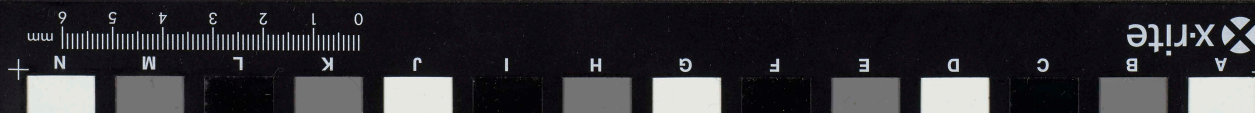
We also want community centres, where neighbours may meet one another and find all kinds of enjoyment and interest. We want more parks and playing fields, more music, more plays, better films, new swimming baths, good, popular restaurants. The Labour Party has published its plans for the provision of these facilities in the first of its series of pamphlets, MANCHESTER TOMORROW. Get this too and read it and give us a mandate to carry out this programme.

All these things it is possible to have, but it is necessary to believe in them, to plan for them and to work for them. That is what we of the Labour Party can do. A great opportunity is open to us. A Labour City Council, working in close harmony with a Labour Government, can make Manchester a place in which all its citizens will be both proud and happy to live. We look to the people of Collyhurst to be in the forefront of this movement.
